# What Beijing's Pacific Agreements Mean for Community Safety

When analysts discuss China's security agreements in the Pacific, the conversation is almost exclusively framed at the strategic level: naval access, surveillance infrastructure, alliance disruption, Indo-Pacific balance of power.<sup>1</sup> What is consistently absent from the analysis is the community level — what China's expanding security presence means for the daily public safety experience of the 2.3 million people who live in Pacific Island nations. ISPI's commentary focuses on this consistently underanalyzed dimension.

## Law Enforcement Capacity and Alignment

---

China's security agreements with Pacific Island nations include provisions for law enforcement training, equipment provision, and technical assistance.<sup>2</sup> For Pacific Island law enforcement agencies with chronic capacity constraints, Chinese assistance offers real operational value. The policy question is not whether this assistance provides value — it does — but what alignment obligations it creates, what intelligence access it enables, and what implications it has for law enforcement practices in communities with significant diaspora connections to the United States and its allies.

**China's disaster response capacity — deployed across Pacific Island communities after major emergency events — provides genuine life-safety value while simultaneously establishing presence, intelligence access, and operational familiarity with Pacific Island infrastructure that serves Chinese strategic interests. The community safety implications of this dual-use engagement are complex and require ongoing independent analysis.**

## ISPI Recommendations

---

1. Develop U.S. and allied Pacific Island law enforcement capacity building programs providing the operational value that Chinese law enforcement assistance offers — with governance structures and alliance relationships that do not create alignment obligations.
2. Commission ISPI and similar institutions to monitor and analyze community-level public safety implications of China's expanding Pacific security presence on an ongoing basis.
3. Engage Pacific Island community safety practitioners directly in U.S. Pacific security policy development — creating policy input channels for island law enforcement and emergency management leaders whose operational experience provides community-level intelligence that strategic analysts do not have.
